



Where are We on the "Big Beautiful" Tax Bill?

- House and Senate have agreed to overall numbers targeted spending and cuts
- There will be spending on defense and immigration, an extension of some (or all) of the Trump Tax Cuts from 2017
- There will also be cuts to programs like TANF, SNAP, Medicaid
- Committees are writing the bill text and making policy decisions
- Starting next week, the House will hold markups on the proposed bill sections, meaning while you are in DC, we will be learning about these proposals in real time – and you can share your message at a critical moment



Why Does the Tax Bill Matter to Us?

- What we want: an enhanced Child and Dependent Care Tax Credit, which helps families keep more of what they earn to pay for child care.
 - This tax credit hasn't been updated to keep up with current prices, Congress should act.
 - The cost of living is rising families need help affording daily needs, like child care.
- What would harm children, families, and communities: cuts to critical programs that provide health care, food and nutrition, and child care



Recommended Messages: Tax + Cut Bill

Underscore the Impact:

- Families depend on both tax credits and subsidies combined to access the child care that they need.
- Making child care more affordable and accessible not only helps families and children, but it also supports a thriving workforce and boosts the economy.
- Cuts harm families and investing in kids leads to better health outcomes, higher educational attainment, and increased earnings as adults. A study by the National Bureau of Economic Research suggests that every dollar the federal government invests in programs that benefit children can amount to \$10 or more in societal returns.



Recommended Messages: Tax + Cut Bill

Make it Personal:

- Include information about the price of child care in your state and how much of a family's income goes towards child care on average.
- A tax credit can help defray some of these expenses for some families.

Children & Families Can't Afford Cuts:

- Medicaid, which ensures healthcare is available to all of us when we need
 it the most, covers 80 million Americans, including kids, seniors, people
 with disabilities, and low-income workers. Nearly 28% of child care
 workers are covered by Medicaid.
- Many states use their TANF funding on child care both by transferring it to subsidies or supporting child care programs directly. Cuts to TANF may mean cuts to child care in our community.

Recommended Messaging on Funding

- Underscore the impact: "Federal child care funding gives over 1.4 million children a strong foundation in child care and early learning programs.
 Because of federal child care funding, over 800,000 working families have less financial strain paying for their child care needs"
- Make it Personal: Include information about how federal child care funding impacts your state and community
- Children & Families can't afford cuts: Current federal funding for CCDBG does not go far enough to serve all children and families who need it
- Head Start: Eliminating Head Start would mean nearly a million fewer quality child care spaces across the country, many in rural areas

Making Child Care Strong: The Role of Child Care Resource & Referral Organizations

Purpose

For over 50 years, Child Care Resource and Referral (CCR&R)¹ organizations have been "the perfect vehicle for making child care in their local communities work better precisely because they touched all the groups that used, provided, and impacted on child care."² At the same time, CCR&Rs have not always been fully understood or recognized by families, child care providers, communities, and policymakers. Like most of America's patchwork child care system, CCR&Rs have been chronically under-resourced, are not available in many states and communities—and consequently, their powerful potential has not always been fully realized.

The purpose of this position statement is twofold:

- To clarify the role and scope of practice of community-based³ child care resource and referral organizations and state child care resource and referral networks.
- To support policymakers, child care resource and referral organizations, and practitioners
 in determining, advocating for, and investing in comprehensive, integrated strategies that
 promote access to high-quality child care that supports all children's healthy development
 and learning, allows parents to work and provide for their families, keeps businesses
 running, and enables our communities to grow and thrive.



Educate Lawmakers About CCR&Rs

- Start at the Beginning: Introduce your organization and the role you play in your community/state
- Emphasize the Impact: CCR&R services build the supply and quality of child care, grow the child care workforce, help families and business solve their child care challenges, and deliver on-the ground information and solutions to support child care demand, supply, and quality... AND MORE
- Be a Resource: Offer data and your on-the-ground expertise to inform child care policy changes and system improvements
