

## Child Care Aware of America's recent report Demanding Change: Repairing our Child Care System found that in 2020 in Hawaii:

## Compared to tuition and housing...



In Hawaii, the average price of infant care in a center-based program is **51.22% more** than the average tuition and fees at an in-state, four-year public university.



In Hawaii, the average price for two children in center-based child care is **47.70% more** than the average annualized rent cost and **1.23%** less than the average annualized mortgage cost.
