In Nevada, the median income for a single-parent family is \$31,641, which means center-based child care for an infant would use **36%** of family median income.

In Nevada, the median income for a married couple is \$85,873, which means center-based child for an infant would use **13%** of family median income.



In Nevada, the average price for two children in center-based child care is **54.46% more** than the average annualized rent cost and **12.20% more** than the average annualized mortgage cost.
