Child Care Aware of America's recent report Demanding Change: Repairing our Child Care System found that in 2020 in Wisconsin:

In Wisconsin, the median income for a single-parent family is \$29,956, which means center-based child care for an infant would use **43%** of family median income.

In Wisconsin, the median income for a married couple is \$101,951, which means center-based child for an infant would use **13%** of family median income.



Compared to tuition and housing...



In Wisconsin, the average price of infant care in a center-based program is **51.51% more** than the average tuition and fees at an in-state, four-year public university.



In Wisconsin, the average price for two children in center-based child care is 128.97% more than the average annualized rent cost and 37.06% more than the average annualized mortgage cost.
