Federal Relief Recap

The end of September marked the deadline for states to liquidate 72% (\$37 billion) in federal relief funding. Some states already liquidated this funding *months* ahead of September 2023.

States have until 9/30/24 to spend remaining ARPA-CCDF discretionary funding (~\$15 billion). Many have already been spending this funding.

The Cliff: States are in variable depending on a few factors.

Making Headway, and More Work to be Done

These wins are not (yet) happening in every state, signaling the need to continue advocating at all levels of government, especially as relief funding expires.

Without immediate action to bolster the child care system, we can anticipate downward trends in child care supply and increases in the cost of child care.

Data and storytelling are powerful tools to (1) underscore the impact of relief funds and (2) make the case for additional investments.



Data: Impact of Relief Funding

CCAoA's Catalyzing Growth report suggests child care relief funding didn't just keep the sector afloat **but** allowed it to recover and grow.

- The number of licensed child care centers open in 2022 exceeded the number open in 2019
- The number of licensed FCC homes continued to decline in 2022; however, the rate of decline was slower than in prior years
- The rise in child care prices from 2021-2022 did not outpace inflation as it had in previous years






Cost and Affordability

Increased public investment is needed to support providers, improve access for families, and allow children to leverage the amazing benefits of high-quality care.




