

Community Mapping Exercise

Complete a community mapping exercise to identify your local resources/assets that could help in the event of a disaster as well as challenges/risks/vulnerabilities that could cause disasters or create problems during a disaster.

Review the area surrounding your location to identify potential resources and vulnerabilities near your agency. Consider the following sources of information for your map:

- Search your community online (e.g., Google Maps)
- Talk to community stakeholders (e.g., Emergency Managers, city officials, etc.)
- Walk or drive around the neighborhood to observe
- Local media, news stories about previous disasters

Resources/Assets include:

- Walkable locations and sidewalks
- Potential relocation sites (in case of an evacuation)
- Hospitals and care centers
- First Responder locations (law enforcement, fire departments, EMS)
- Other child care stakeholders
- Community-serving organizations

Challenges/risks/Vulnerabilities include:

- Potential hazards or risks near your location such as:
 - Flood prone areas/dams
 - Train tracks
- Infrastructure challenges (e.g., traffic, bridges)
- Major highways and roadways
- Lack of sidewalks/safe access points
